Gott's Roadside

For a quick burger in wine country, look no farther than this roadside icon that opened in 1949, long before Napa was renowned for wine. A bit of a naming feud led to the hamburger haven's (formerly known as Taylor's) name change. At Gott's Roadside Tray Gourmet, while the prices seem high, so is the quality—know that juicy Niman Ranch beef lies between buns, beneath toppings like grilled mushrooms or guacamole. The restaurant also churns out hot dogs topped with hearty homemade chile and sides of sweet potato fries. Gott's refreshes with milk shakes, draft beers, and local wines by the glass, half-bottle, or bottle.

All three locations (San Francisco's Ferry Building and Napa's Oxbow Public Market) have picnic tables perfect for alfresco dining.



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
